# EROSION AND SEDIMENTATION CONTROL PROGRAM

The priority of the erosion and sedimentation pollution control program is the protection of water resources from the impacts of accelerated erosion and sedimentation that results during an earthmoving activity. The District has been given the authority to administer the erosion and sedimentation control and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) programs by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

Program technicians continue to conduct plan reviews, site inspections, complaint investigations, workshops and process NPDES permits. The District maintains a Level III enforcement delegation with the DEP. The delegation requires that the District prepare, commence and execute enforcement actions in compliance with the Programs Compliance Assistance and Enforcement Manual. Since July 2013, the District continues to retain the post construction stormwater management (PCSM) delegation level. This allows the District to conduct technical reviews of the PCSM plans for Individual NPDES permits, which allows much needed technical assistance in the development of these plans to be offered at the local level.

# CHESAPEAKE BAY PROGRAM

## **Agricultural Erosion and Sediment Control Plans**

The Chesapeake Bay Program completed several projects in 2017. Agricultural Erosion and Sediment Control Plans and Conservation Plans were written for farmers by Conservation District staff and consultants with funding from the Chesapeake Bay Special Projects and Marcellus Shale Unconventional Gas Well fund programs. Ag E&S Plans for 6 farms totaling 880 acres were written, and a conservation plan for one farm was written totaling 20 acres. These plans are important tools for farmers that address erosion and identify conservation practices that can be implemented on the farm.

## **Pre-Sidedress Soil Nitrogen Test (PSNT)**

For the 17<sup>th</sup> year, the Chesapeake Bay Program offered a Pre-Sidedress Soil Nitrogen Test (PSNT) to farmers in the county. This soil test is designed to prevent unnecessary nitrogen application to corn crop or identify extra nitrogen that is needed. This can help the farmer save money and increase crop yields. In addition to the added benefits to the farmer, this benefits the environment by using nitrogen fertilizers efficiently. In 2017, two interns tested 24 participating farmers' fields totaling 2,671 acres of corn. Out of the 134 fields tested, 13 were given a recommendation of needing extra nitrogen to meet the crop's needs. This program will be offered again in 2018.

## **Chesapeake Bay Farm Inspections**

The Cumberland County Conservation District, with the guidance of DEP, continued Chesapeake Bay farm inspections in 2017. These inspections are checking that farms that generate or spread manure and/or have tilled ground, which includes no-till operations. The inspections are checking that farmers have their Manure Management Plans and/or their Chapter 102 Agricultural Erosion and Sediment Control Plans, where applicable. Technicians with the CCCD completed 50 inspections for Fiscal Year 16-17 totaling 5,508 acres. A total of 41 inspections were found to be out of compliance with Pennsylvania state regulations, but 22 of those farms were brought into compliance before June 30, 2017 with the remaining farms working towards compliance.

## **Education**

The 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Corn Planter Clinic was held on December 13th at the Shippensburg Auction Center. There were over 130 participants including farmers, vendors, and various government agencies.

# NUTRIENT MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

## Nutrient Management

The Cumberland County Conservation District (CCCD) continued 2017 as a participant in Pennsylvania's ACT 38 Program (Nutrient Management) as a Level 2 delegated district. The State Conservation Commission (SCC) delegates the tasks of writing and reviewing Nutrient Management Plans and inspecting ACT 38 participating farms for compliance. CCCD has written 3 plans for volunteer farms and reviewed plans that were approved by our Board of Directors. 13 site inspections were performed of ACT 38 participating farms to ensure the practices outlined in each farm's plans were being implemented. Nutrient Management Plans aid farmers in exactly meeting the nutritional needs of their crops, therefore the plans continue to be the best tool for farmers to prevent pollution on farms that generate manure while maximizing crop yields. Pennsylvania encourages every farm to consider the benefits of a Nutrient Management Plan to be written, approved, and implemented. If you have interest in obtaining an ACT 38 Nutrient Management Plan, please contact us and we can discuss options to have it written.

Additionally, Cumberland County's Nutrient Management Program was audited by the State Conservation Commission and DEP. Our program was found to be fully in compliance and excelling in outreach to the community and farmers.



## Manure Management

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) continued to delegate the responsibility of outreach, education, and complaint investigation of the Manure Management Program to the Cumberland County Conservation District through 2017. Manure Management Plans (MMP) are required by every farm in Pennsylvania that generates or uses manure. CCCD has continued to assist farmers in writing the plans and educate the farmers on the requirements of manure management at local events.



The District held 3 workshops where 17 farmers were able to obtain a written plan at the end of the day and assisted or wrote an additional 14 MMPs. If you would be interested in receiving assistance for a Manure Management Plan please contact our office to attend a workshop or work with the District individually. In 2017 the District investigated 4 complaints regarding manure. As Cumberland County continues to be a leader in agriculture, we must work together to achieve high yields while protecting the natural resources of the county. Both are possible through careful planning and implementation of Best Management Practices outlined in Nutrient and Manure Management Plans.

# WATERSHED PROGRAM

## Grant Activities

The **Unconventional Gas Well Fund Mini Grants** were awarded to the Big Spring Watershed Association, Conodoguinet Creek Watershed Association, Middle Spring Watershed Association, and Yellow Breeches Watershed Association. The grants varied greatly in scope. Big Spring WA constructed a native pollinator garden and constructed a rock vane deflector, which increases water velocity that creates turbulence in the channel while increasing oxygen levels and volatilizing nitrogen. Conodoguinet Creek WA hosted two rain barrel workshops and gave away 50 Rain Barrels to participants. Middle Spring WA created a trash interceptor collector. Yellow Breeches WA helped to fund their annual creek cleanup event and also helped to fund plants for installation in two rain gardens.

The **Conodoguinet Creek Watershed Snapshot** is a public event that includes collecting water samples from the main stem of the Creek and its shale and limestone tributaries. Volunteers collect samples from the Creek or tribs and then test the water for nonpoint source pollutants. After the samples are tested, participants visit booths about sources for nonpoint source pollution in both our urban environments and our rural landscapes. The Snapshot tested its samples from the Summer, Fall, and Winter events and will host its last event in the Spring, on March 3, 2018.

Funding was provided through a Nonpoint Source Adult Education Mini-Grant from the Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts (PACD). Partners include: Alliance for Aquatic Resource Monitoring (ALLARM), Conodoguinet Creek WA, Big Spring WA, and Middle Spring WA, Pennsylvania Association of Conservation Districts, Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection, Environmental Protection Agency, and all of our volunteers who helped to collect and analyze samples!

# DIRT , GRAVEL & LOW VOLUME ROADS PROGRAM

The **Dirt and Gravel Roads Program** is available for any public road that has a dirt, gravel, or stone surface. This year finished the drainage installation on Cold Springs Road in Dickinson Township. The drainage work started in the summer of 2016 which installed 23 cross pipes, and continued construction in 2017, with 20 more cross pipes, for a total of 43 cross pipes! This year's construction also included 1,250 feet of underdrain, which collects subsurface drainage in the road profile. Grant money for the 2017 portion of the project was \$19,993.56, and the total grant value of the project was \$48,563.69. Future work will place base material and driving surface aggregate.



The **Low Volume Roads Program** is open to all paved public roads that have less than 500 cars per day. Construction projects for 2017 included Game Lands Road in Upper Mifflin Township, replacing three failing cross pipes. Grant money for Game Lands Road was \$12,413.85, with a total project value of \$12,413.85. Fry Road in North Newton Township replaced 2 pipes and installed 1,025 feet of underdrain. Grant money for Fry Road was \$10,572.86, with a total project value of \$19,522.46. Beetem Hollow Road in Penn Township replaced a 4 foot stream culvert with a

12 foot box culvert with an open bottom for aquatic organism passage and included a 500 foot French Mattress with 800 feet of underdrain to drain the road profile. Grant money for Beetem Hollow Road was \$138,044.09, with a total project value of \$181,649.93. Future work is planned on Beetem Hollow Road, Penn Township; Pipeline Road, Upper Mifflin Township; and Yorwick Road,


### 2017 Cumberland County Conservation District Annual Golf Tournament



The Cumberland County Envirothon, presented by the Cumberland County Conservation District, is a fun academic event that provides high school students hands-on field experience dealing with environmental issues. Students complete five exams that test their knowledge on aquatics, forestry, soils, wildlife, and a current issue, which was *Agriculture Soil & Water Conservation Stewardship*. 116 students participated this year and endured quite the windy but sunny day. Schools participating in the



competition include Big Spring, Boiling Springs, Camp Hill, Carlisle, Cedar Cliff, Cumberland Valley, East Pennsboro, Mechanicsburg and Shippensburg.



Representatives from the PA Fish and Boat Commission, PA Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, PA Game Commission, the Conservation District, and Natural Resources Conservation Service administered the tests.

Once the competition was over, the students enjoyed a picnic lunch provided by the Mechanicsburg Sportsmen's Association. After lunch, the Conservation District and Barb Cross handed out awards. The awards, made from Pennsylvania hardwood, were given to the top three teams at each station and the top three teams overall. All participating students and advisors received an Envirothon t-shirt sponsored by Adams Electric Cooperative.
